ROOTS OF THE CONFLICT, DUAL NARRATIVES

MartyrMade Podcast: Fear and Loathing in the New Jerusalem (2015).

This is a thought-provoking plunge into the roots of the Arab-Israeli conflict if you can handle Darryl Cooper's accent and overdramatic style. The episodes are long but it's hard to stop listening to this guy who is alternately empathetic to each side. On YouTube, iTunes, Spotify.

Like any nationalist movement, it's a lot more complex than either side usually admits.
Part 2 - Jews, Arabs & National Identity. <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=NLYLZUeRaJs</u> Darryl begins with a great essay into the idea of nationalism, then moves to the roots of Arab, and later Palestinian, nationalism, including their complex relations with the Zionists, with colorful bio's of figures like Emir Faisal and David Ben Gurion (his history is very male-oriented).

Contested Land, Contested Memory: Israel's Jews and Arabs and the Ghosts of Catastrophe. Jo Roberts (2013). "After a war, the victors write history. How was the story of the exiled Palestinians erased – from textbooks, maps, even the land? How do Jewish and Palestinian Israelis now engage with the histories of the Palestinian Nakba and the Holocaust, and how do these echo through the political and physical landscapes of their country?"

Two Sides of the Coin: Independence and Nakba 1948. (2011; English-Hebrew edition and English-Arabic edition). Eds: Motti Golani and Adel Manna, "One of the most important questions asked in this conflict over narrative is: what happened in 1948? Paying special attention to social and economic factors, she examines the gradual transformation of Palestine, following the history of the region through the Egyptian occupation...the Ottoman reform era, and the British Mandate up to the founding of Israel in 1948. Focusing on the interactions of Arabs and Jews, [she] tells how these connections affected the cultural and political evolution of each community..."

Year Zero of the Arab-Israeli Conflict: 1929. Hillel Cohen (2015). Original Hebrew: תרפ"ט. A readable book by an Israeli historian with surprising views. "In late summer 1929, a countrywide outbreak of Arab-Jewish-British violence transformed the political landscape of Palestine forever. ACTIVISM, RESISTANCE and DIALOGUE

<u>Five Broken Cameras</u> (2013, Arabic, English subtitles). A personal account of one village's determination to stop the Separation Barrier. The residents of Bil'in, a West Bank village, became famous for their weekly demonstations against the Barrier, aided by international and Israeli activists. <u>Arna's Children</u>. Amazing documentary about the Freedom Theater in Jenin that was led by an Israeli woman totally committed to the Palestinian cause. Budrus (2009, Arabic+Hebrew, Engl.subtitles). Israeli-Palestinian documentary about Ayed Morrar, a Palestinian whose work for Fatah led to five detentions in Israeli jails. <u>The Field</u> (2017, Hebrew+Arabic, English subtitles). Ali Abu Awwad dedicates his family's field between Jerusalem and Hebron as a meeting place for Palestinians and settlers. Despite his years in an Israeli prison and a brother killed by the IDF, he creates "Roots-Juduur" with local Israelis to try to create dialogue with his Jewish neighbors. In the Eye of the Storm (Hebrew, English subtitles, 68 mins). Bereaved Families Circle is an organization established by Israelis and Palestinians who lost family members in the Conflict, to promote dialogue. The film follows Bassam Aramin, whose daughter was killed by a soldier, and Rami Elhanan, whose daughter was killed in a suicide bombing. Disturbing the Peace (2017, Arabic & Hebrew, English subtitles, 110 mins). *Combatants for Peace* is a joint Israeli-Palestinian NGO that began as a dialogue between ex-combatants. The film depicts what motivated these Israelis and Palestinians to take up arms against each other (IDF soldiers, Fatah activists, a suicide bomber) and each one's personal transformation that led him/her to eventually join a non-violent, bi-national peace movement. The film reflects their hesitations, and the resistance they encounter in their homes, as the group developed.

JERUSALEM

To Die in Jerusalem (2007, English, Hebrew, Arabic). "In March 2002, Jerusalem teen Rachel Levy was killed in a suicide bombing carried out by Palestinian teen Ayat al-Akhras. Though their religious backgrounds would suggest that they had little in common, both girls were 17 years old, bore an uncanny physical resemblance to one another, and spent the majority of their woefully brief lives less than four miles apart." https://www.snagfilms.com/films/title/to_die_in_jerusalem

<u>Jerusalem the East Side Story</u> (2008, English, Arabic & Hebrew). Palestinian documentary on Israel's policy in Jerusalem since 1967. Director: Mohamad Alatar.

IDF, SETTLERS, SECOND INTIFADA

<u>Checkpoint מחסוב</u> (2001, Hebrew & Arabic; English subtitles). Award-winning Israeli film shows the everyday interaction between Israeli soldiers and Palestinians at several checkpoints just before the second Intifada, mostly from the soldiers' perspective.

<u>The Settlers המתנהלים</u> (2016, Hebrew with English subtitles). Comprehensive documentary of the settlement enterprise from 1967 until today. Interviews with many settler leaders and with those opposed to them. Shows how a tiny, determined minority of Israelis with a messianic ideology led to the situation today: over half a million Israelis live in the West Bank.

<u>Days of Awe ימים נוראים</u>. (2019, Hebrew). Drama, based on true story of the 1995 assassination of Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin. Focusing on the assassin Yigal Amir, it vividly portrays the atmosphere that led a right-wing Jewish Israeli to this extreme act.

<u>Unsettled מתנחלת</u> (2018, Hebrew w/English subtitles?). Amazing documentary by a Tel Aviv left-winger who "settles" in a West Bank settlement and interviews its residents.

Jenin Jenin (2002, 54 min). Film documenting the IDF invasion of Jenin refugee camp, from which originated many suicide bombers, in the Second Intifada. Muhammad Bakri, a well-known Israeli-Palestinian actor-director, made the film to show the viewpoint of the Jenin camp residents. He was sued by IDF soldiers who claimed the film was distorted – the case reached Israel's Supreme Court which ruled that indeed some parts were factually false. Bakri claims he just gave the voiceless a voice.

HOW THE OCCUPATION WORKS

<u>GAZA</u>

I Shall Not Hate – A Gaza Doctor's journey. Dr. Izzeldin Abuelaish (2011). Extraordinary book by a Harvard-educated Palestinian doctor who was born and raised in a refugee camp in the Gaza Strip and "has devoted his life to medicine and reconciliation between Israelis and Palestinians" (New York Times). Drinking the Sea at Gaza. Amira Hass (2000). Her book "shares Gaza's early euphoria over the peace process and its subsequent despair as hope gives way to unrelenting hardship. Beautiful, haunting, and profound, it will stand with the great works of wartime reportage."

סהכיר את חמאס (*To Know Hamas* 2012) Shlomi Eldar (Hebrew, translated to English?). Fascinating account of Hamas as a political and military organization, by an Israeli journalist with ties to Hamas leaders and Israeli leaders.

<u>In Between אָ אָשם אָ אָש</u> (2017, Arabic, with subtitles. 102 mins). Three young Palestinian-Israeli women sharing an apartment in Tel Aviv, find themselves torn between traditional culture and the modern world.

<u>Sandstorm סופת הול</u> (2018, Arabic w/Hebrew&English subtitles). Award-winning drama about a Negev Bedouin woman's struggle against patriarchy.

The Lemon Tree. Sandy Tolan (2016) audio book/MP3CD.

"A true story of a remarkable relationship between two families [...] Bashir sees dispossession and occupation; Dalia, who arrived in 1948 with her family from Bulgaria, sees hope for a people devastated by the Holocaust. As both are swept up in the fates of their people, and Bashir is jailed for his alleged part in a supermarket bombing, the friends do not speak for years. They finally reconcile and convert the house in Ramle into a day-care centre for Arab children of Israel, and a center for dialogue between Arabs and Jews.

<u>Portrait of Victory (Hebrew: **תמונת נצחון**</u> Israeli fictional film (2021) based on the capture of kibbutz Nitzanim by the Egyptian army in 1948. Aspires to show the battle from both sides.

My Promised Land – The triumph and tragedy of Israel. Ari Shavit (2015). An Israeli journalist surveys Israel from his personal (Zionist-humanist) viewpoint. His account includes Zionism's "heroic" chapters, e.g. establishment of kibbutzim and its dark sides, e.g. the destruction of Palestinian society, racism, etc.

A History of Israel from the Rise of Zionism to Our Time. Howard Sachar (2013). "This is a truly enriching and exhaustive history of a nation that holds claim to one of the most complicated and controversial histories in the world."

James Baldwin

James Baldwin's *The Fire Next Time* (1963) comprises two autobiographical essays in which the author confronts the racial issues and tensions that he believes corrupt and deform American life and the American dream. Baldwin's essays exemplify and precursor many of the elements and arguments central to the Civil Rights movement

bell hooks

Feminism is for Everybody

Beginning with a broad survey of feminism's most important themes and concerns, bell hooks demystifies contentious concepts and turns apparent ideology into common sense. hooks encourages us to demand alternatives to patriarchal, racist and homophobic culture and thereby to seek out a different future.

Nick Estes

Our History Is the Future

Standing Rock Versus the Dakota Access Pipeline, and the Long Tradition of Indigenous Resistance - In Our History Is the Future, Nick Estes traces traditions of Indigenous resistance that led to the #NoDAPL movement.

Jasbir Puar

The Right to Maim: Debility, Capacity, Disability

In *The Right to Maim* Jasbir K. Puar brings her pathbreaking work on the liberal state, sexuality, and biopolitics to bear on our understanding of disability. Drawing on a stunning array of theoretical and methodological frameworks, Puar uses the concept of "debility"—bodily injury and social exclusion brought on by economic and political factors—to disrupt the category of disability.

Do Muslim Women Need Saving?

Do Muslim Women Need Saving? is an indictment of a mindset that has justified all manner of foreign interference, including military invasion, in the name of rescuing women from Islam—as well as a moving portrait of women's actual experiences, and of the contingencies with which they live.

Frantz Fanon

The Wretched of the Earth

First published in 1961, Frantz Fanon's The Wretched of the Earth is a masterful and timeless interrogation of race, colonialism, psychological trauma, and revolutionary struggle. In 2020, it found a new readership in the wake of the Black Lives Matter protests and the centering of narratives interrogating race by Black writers. Bearing singular insight into the rage and frustration of colonized peoples, and the role of violence in spurring

historical change, the book incisively attacks the twin perils of postindependence colonial politics: the disenfranchisement of the masses by the elites on the one hand, and intertribal and interfaith animosities on the other.

Aimé Césaire

Discourse on Colonialism

Aimé Césaire eloquently describes the brutal impact of capitalism and colonialism on both the colonizer and colonized, exposing the contradictions and hypocrisy implicit in western notions of progress and civilization upon encountering the savage, uncultured, or primitive. Here, Césaire reaffirms African values, identity, and culture, and their relevance, reminding us that the relationship between consciousness and reality are extremely complex.

<u>Ghassan Kanafani</u>

Men in the Sun

This collection of important stories by novelist, journalist, teacher, and Palestinian activist Ghassan Kanafani includes the stunning novella Men in the Sun (1962), the basis of the film The Deceived. In the unsparing clarity of his writing, Kanafani offers the reader a gritty look at the agonized world of Palestine and the adjoining Middle East.
