The price of electricity in Israel, largely due to natural gas, is among the lowest in the West; "Much lower, for example, from countries like Britain, or Norway, or Germany."



In Haifa 11,000 (2015/6)






Payment for electricity around 20% of household expenses In poor families with limited income

Realizing rights and mediation with the electricity company

Civil literacy around proper power consumption

Raising awareness among families, young people and children

Concrete help in subsidizing electricity costs for needy families

Meetings with the front line -electricity company
